A message from Fay Duncan, President & Eric Wright, Managing Director

2013 has been a terrific year for our Foundation. We have seen some of our major projects come to life – such as the opening of Hilltop, our Albury Wodonga Patient and Carer Accommodation Centre, in March.

It was a year to review our current programs and see how we can grow in order to support even more people living with cancer and other life threatening illnesses.

Our partnership with The Royal Children's Hospital and the Children's Hospital at Westmead continued to grow through our Youth and Education Programs. In 2014, we hope to expand these programs into more hospitals around Australia.

Working in partnership with The Royal Melbourne Hospital, we were also pleased to launch our first Grants in Aid in October.

These special \$25,000 Grants are designed to give PhD graduates the opportunity to extend their PhD research to build larger proposals which will support the ultimate goal of finding a cure for blood cancers and other blood disorders.

This year we met some inspiring people, including Angie Jackman and her two year old son Wilson. Wilson needed a cord blood transplant to live. The Jackman's stayed at BMDI Rotary House in Melbourne and Wilson made a full recovery. Angie then went back to Bendigo and raised \$12,000 through her own Pop-Up Shop for the Foundation.

We also met Kelly and Ally – two passionate young women from Albury who wanted to do their part to help the fundraising appeal for Hilltop. They started a group called 'Chicks Walk for a Cause' to raise

\$10,000 by undertaking the Camino de Santiago Walk—a five week, 780 kilometre trek from France across the top of Spain. They raised \$32,000!

We were thrilled to see Footy Colours Day grow to its biggest day ever, with an estimated 500,000 Australians taking part to support us to raise more than \$500,000. It was a great example of how small actions can make a big difference.

2013 represented a year for community. This annual report is for the people who have inspired and enriched our lives and who have made a difference in the fight against cancer.





Fay Duncan, honoured for a lifetime of fighting cancer

Fight Cancer Foundation was established by people determined to make a difference. Fay Duncan is a founding member of Fight Cancer Foundation which was formed by a small group of concerned parents as the Bone Marrow Donor Institute in 1989. Fay and her 'team' were instrumental in establishing the Australian Bone Marrow Donor Registry and the BMDI Cord Blood Bank and many other support programs, including the welcome respite of accommodation centres for regional patients who need to be near major treating hospitals.

Fay's involvement has been crucial to the establishment and expansion of this charity that provides hope and a second chance of life to patients living with cancer.

In 1991 Fay played the leading role in assuming responsibility for a

project to build office space and research laboratories for Fight Cancer Foundation. The Capital Appeal Committee was launched and ultimately raised more than \$3.5m to complete this project in 1993. Today the Rotary Bone Marrow Research Centre is still home to Fight Cancer Foundation, with the laboratory space gifted to The Royal Melbourne Hospital.

In 2001, Fay chaired a steering committee to successfully establish the viability of the 'Back on Track' program. During this period Fay also served on the 'Accommodation Centre Appeal Committee' which raised \$4m to establish Fight Cancer Foundation's first accommodation centre, BMDI Rotary House in North Melbourne which opened in 2003, followed by John Opie House in Hobart in 2008 and Hilltop in Albury in 2013.

Fay's contribution laid the foundation for the growth of Fight Cancer Foundation into a leading Australian charity. Her entrepreneurial talent has been crucial in raising the profile and awareness of Fight Cancer Foundation.

Fay has engaged an extensive network of supportive volunteers, including Patrons Deborra-lee Furness and Hugh Jackman who play a key role in promoting Fight Cancer Foundation.

In 2013, Fay was recognised by the prestigious Columbia University Medical Center in New York for her outstanding dedication over many years to improving the lives of patients with leukaemia and other blood cancers.

Fay was also honoured in New York by the United States-based Gabrielle's Angel Foundation at their

annual Angel Ball in October 2013 as a tribute to her many years of hard work in developing and delivering vital support programs and funding major research projects for cancer patients and their families.

Under Fay's Chairmanship, the next phase in the life of Fight Cancer Foundation will see a growth in regional accommodation centres, collaboration with key researchers into leukaemia and other blood cancers, young students achieving their study and life goals and the growth of support services and programs - always towards the target of improving outcomes for people living with cancer.



Leonie Walsh, Lead Scientist for Victoria

In July 2013, Director Leonie Walsh was announced as the new Lead Scientist for Victoria by The Minister for Innovation, Services and Small Business, Louise Asher who stated that connections between Victoria's scientific and research community and industry would be enhanced with this engagement.

As Lead Scientist, Leonie works closely with key scientific roles in agencies from within Victoria and around Australia to provide strategic advice across the whole of Government on issues impacting on Victoria's future.

Leonie is responsible for fostering linkages across the innovation value chain, including industry groups, academic organisations and other publicly and privately funded science and technology based organisations. In addition,

she will promote awareness in the community of the importance of science, technology and innovation in the state's future economic, social and environmental wellbeing.

Following a bone marrow transplant in 1989, Leonie joined Fight Cancer Foundation in 1992 as a Director. She has accumulated more than 25 years of experience in technology leadership roles with multi-national companies such as Visy, Henkel and Dow Chemical.

Leonie is the current Honorary President of the Australasian Industrial Research Group and in that role has lead the development of new models for collaboration between small to medium enterprise and researchers and established international collaborations through a new World Federation of Industrial Research Associations.

Leonie is also a non-executive Director of the Australian Bone Marrow Donor Registry.

"Leonie is an amazingly dedicated and committed scientist and we are delighted she has been bestowed with this honour," said Fight Cancer Foundation Managing Director Eric Wright.

"I am delighted that Ms Walsh will be engaged in the role of Lead Scientist, given her experience in the management and commercialisation of research and her understanding of the importance of science and technology in driving business innovation and future success," said Ms Asher.

Saying thank you to Sophia Elliott

Sophia joined the Bone Marrow Donor Institute in 1990 and has been a Director since 1991. During this time, Sophia has worked passionately as a volunteer, employee and director and we take this time to say thanks.

With a 35 year career in advertising, marketing and PR, Sophia has been actively involved with all our major fundraising events and organisation milestones. She was committed to establishing a bone marrow donor registry in Australia and developing the BMDI Cord Blood Bank and was integral in the fundraising behind our office space and research laboratories at The Royal Melbourne Hospital.

When Fight Cancer Foundation's mascot Bo Bear made his first appearance in 1994 to encourage Australians to join the Bone Marrow Donor Registry, Sophia was working

full-time outside the organisation, but still came in after work every night, sat in the office and packed thousands of Bo Bears AND organised to send Bo Bear radio commercials around Australia—raising hundreds of thousands of dollars.

For the past 22 years, Sophia has also been a member of the organising committee for the Red Ball and came up with the name 'Red Ball'.

Through the 90's Sophia's creativity spurred a wave of fundraising ideas including a promotional balloon launch at the MCG - one balloon was found all the way over in New Zealand! Sophia was also involved in the support and fundraising for our first accommodation centre, BMDI Rotary House in 2003 and our newest accommodation centre; 'Hilltop' in 2012, Sophia also came up with the name of 'Hilltop'.

In 2002, the Lap for Leukaemia was held simultaneously in Brisbane, Sydney and at Crown in Melbourne. It was a star-studded event which saw celebrities such as Eddie McGuire, Ian Botham, Simon Madden, Dermott Brereton, Cathy Freeman Dean Jones and Deborra-lee Furness walking on treadmills for sponsorship.

Sophia pioneered the charity walk concept back in 2003, when Dean Jones walked from Sydney to Melbourne—as did Sophia—arriving at the MCG on Day One of the Boxing Day Test. David Boon, in 2004, walked from Melbourne to Bellerive Oval in Hobart—again so did Sophia. These two Walks followed the success of Ian Botham's charity walks around Great Britain.

When we outgrew our name, and became more than the Bone Marrow Donor Institute, we needed

a new name. Sophia drove the project research and helped create the brand of which we are all so proud.

Sophia's commitment together with her drive and determination, has seen Fight Cancer Foundation develop and deliver services to cancer patients and their families and support vital cancer research programs which enhance our quality of life.

Angie Jackman A Mother's Story

Scott and Angie Jackman's young son Wilson was diagnosed with a rare immune deficiency when he was just 18 months old.

 Wilson first started to get sick with ear infections at just 12 weeks old. I felt like I was going through a revolving door with doctors. Having trained as a nurse, I kept seeking answers for Wilson's frequent illnesses.

I kept returning to various doctors, determined to find the answer. Finally at 18 months, my darling boy was diagnosed with a life threatening immune deficiency. There were only 300 cases diagnosed in the world and I had to stop myself from reading the frightening research on the outcomes.

Wilson had no chance of survival without treatment and had a life expectancy of 12 months.

Then we learned that the only treatment that could save Wilson was a bone marrow or cord blood transplant.

Each family member was tested. I was hopeful that one of us would be a match, but even his brother Harry failed to be a suitable match to save Wilson's life.

Our job was to ensure that Wilson was isolated and germ-free to reduce his risk of infection while the Australian Bone Marrow Donor Registry searched for a cord blood match for Wilson.

The next six months was an agonising waiting game. Both my husband and I had to stop work and I kept everyone at home, away from the risk of infection. Finally we received the call. In March we travelled from our home

in Bendigo to Melbourne for Wilson's life saving cord blood transplant.

There were times when I thought that Wilson might not make it. I will remember for the rest of my life where every night I would beg him to stay with me for just another 24 hours. Because of Wilson's condition we had to be within five minutes walking distance to the hospital and I will be forever thankful for the accommodation provided by Fight Cancer Foundation.

Today, four year old Wilson and older brother Harry are at school – our lives are returning to normal.

“ I started working for Fight Cancer Foundation in 2009 for a few hours a week to help out at John Opie House in Hobart. I then took over the role as House Manager in January 2010. Fight Cancer Foundation and the support that their accommodation centres provide have been close to my heart for more than 10 years.

I experienced first hand the positive impact a support network can have on a family going through such a life changing experience. When my mum had a bone marrow transplant years ago we were welcomed warmly into the Fight Cancer Foundation family.

When I come to work each day I am coming to my other home and the patients and their carers who stay at John Opie House are my second family. Generally our House is short term accommodation, but more and more I am having patients and families stay for anything up to four months and the best thing about my

work here is seeing their journey unfold, helping and guiding them. I love it when they give me a call or send me a note to let me know how they are doing.

Often when patients or carers arrive at the House it is for an emergency, so they are scared and confused and have no idea what is going to happen to them or their loved one. Many people like to sit and talk things through for a little while because they have not had the opportunity to process what is happening and they are on their own, away from other family and friends.

I make sure they know that they are welcome to stay in the House as long as **””**

“ My husband Ian and I were residents of BMDI Rotary House in previous years. In appreciation of all the help and support we received during this time I wanted to give back through volunteering. I took on a volunteer part-time caretaking role for two years before becoming full-time manager early 2013.

I have been associated with Fight Cancer Foundation/Bone Marrow Donor Institute for 23 years and love being able to support and provide assistance to the residents when their lives have just been turned upside down. They are lost, frightened, insecure and are finding it hard to take in all they have been told at such a rapid pace and understanding what is likely to happen during the time ahead, being separated from their families, not knowing anyone in Melbourne who can support them. This gives me great satisfaction to be able to sit with them to try and smooth out the issues.

On arrival there is paperwork to finalise and a house walk tour, a run through of house rules and the fire evacuation plan. On most occasions guests have been booked in through the hospital and have not seen the accommodation centre before. It can take a couple of hours for new guests to become settled and feel comfortable.

The proximity of the accommodation centre to the major hospitals, the security for them and the car parking we provide are **””** major factors in alleviating guests' worries.

Alexander Davenport

Research Scientist

 In my standard scientific day I have any number of experiments that need to be completed, but it ALWAYS starts with a coffee. I don't think I have met a scientist yet who doesn't have some form of mild caffeine addiction!

When I'm not in the lab I am usually reading journal articles, thinking of more experiments to conduct or out with my camera taking photos. The problem with experimentation is that the more experiments I do that yield an answer to one question, five more questions arise. It is exciting, but it can be exhausting and knowing when to stop is the trickiest part.

The first thing I do scientifically every morning is to check my cells and make sure they are growing, dividing and becoming activated. These form the basis of most of my experiments whether they are for in vitro or in vivo experiments, so if they fall over at

any point I have to start again. Due to the nature of my cells and where they come from I try to maximize the number of experiments and amount of data I can get out of each cohort. At any one time I will be running approximately 3 or 4 experiments that complement each other.

Luckily with my branch of science (Cancer Immunology) I have a fair amount of incubation time and that allows me to fit in experiment write ups, more journal article readings, lunch or anything else I need to get done. In the afternoon I use the large pieces of equipment that allow me to read the data such as the live video microscope or a Fluorescence-activated cell sort (FACS) machine (which is a fancy way of saying I run the cells through a machine and sort them by different fluorescent tags).

Approximately once or twice a week I get to kill cancer cells using my

therapy. This data always excites me because I'm trying to directly correlate this with what happens in patients. Once these experiments have finished it is normally about 3:30-4pm so another coffee is almost definitely warranted (and by this time deserved). I usually have a coffee with Professor David Ritchie, Head of BMT and Deputy Director of Clinical Haematology, and my other supervisors, which makes for a great informal meeting for me to discuss any data that is coming through that I either may not understand or I get really excited over.

After this it is normally time to analyse the data and solidify any ideas that have come out from the day's experiments, sometimes though I can fit in a small check FACS experiment to answer one of the 5 questions that arise if I still have the cells. I will then plan a new experiment to either back up the days data, or an experiment

that may be the next logical step. This normally occurs with the headphones on and some form of 70's or 80's rock deafening my poor ears.

Unfortunately as a scientist it is not all about exciting experiments so at the end of the day I tend to do all my paper work such as writing up the experiments at length, writing sections of my papers, putting together power point talks or reports for the PhD milestones.

Inevitably I end up running out of work about 6:58pm to catch the 7pm train with a list of excuses as to why I'm yet again late home to my long suffering partner.

I tend to work fairly long days which have some big highs (when the experiments work) and lows (when they don't), but worth every second of it.

David is an Education Coordinator for the Back on Track program at The Children's Hospital at Westmead. His two great passions in life are working with children and tackling sporting challenges. In 2013, he combined his two great passions for a worthy cause.



Running eight marathons in five months was a challenge, but it was nothing compared to the mammoth challenges the young people I work with every day have to endure.

I completed a marathon in every state of Australia to raise money and awareness for the children and young people I work with through the Back on Track program.

Children can spend up to two years away from school while undergoing treatment for cancer. Back on Track ensures the educational social and welfare needs of children and young

people in the program are met during cancer treatment as well as through the transition back to school.

My challenge started in the nation's capital in April 2013 when I completed the Canberra Marathon, then moved on to Victoria to conquer the Great Ocean Road event followed by marathons in Perth, the Gold Coast, the Northern Territory, Adelaide and Ross in Tasmania, before finishing in Sydney.

Each day I am inspired by the children and young people I teach, and their families who are living through the stress and heartache of a cancer diagnosis and treatment. During my marathon challenge I often drew on the courage displayed by those families to push past those moments when it was all too much and my legs could have given in.

I am passionate about education, and believe all children should have the

same access to schooling despite their personal challenges. I know it sounds clichéd, but I do what I do, and I did what I did for the kids.

Linda and Sue's day begins at 6:30am at The Royal Women's Hospital when they check the weighing and refrigeration equipment, theatre list, emails, phone messages, and organise the delivery kits.

 "We love our jobs! We can't imagine doing anything else!" - Linda and Sue are cord blood nurses and teammates. Then we head to the maternity ward to visit the expectant mums, where we explain the cord blood donation program and hopefully recruit some mums-to-be.

Most women are very happy. They are willing and very pleased to know their donation might help save a life, says Linda.

As Linda heads off to theatre for a delivery, Sue continues to talk with the expectant mums and records

the medical history of those donating their baby's cord blood. After the collection is made, Linda is back in her office weighing the cord blood, completing the documentation and preparing it to be sent for processing.

She then heads to the recovery room to collect a blood sample from the new mum. This sample is sent for analysis to confirm the state of health of mum at the time of delivery.

The whole process begins again with the next delivery. This time it might be Sue in the delivery room collecting the cord blood.

At 4:40pm the courier arrives to collect the cord blood donations to be sent to the BMDI Cord Blood Bank at The Royal Children's Hospital for processing.

Our day is over as soon as the donations leave for the cord blood

bank, says Sue. Both Linda and I feel so privileged to do this job.

The mums are so generous to allow us to share their special time and so committed to doing something that might just help save a life, adds Linda. We leave work happy knowing what we do can make a  real difference.

Since 1996–11,548 cords have been banked through the AusCord network of public cord blood banks and 484 cords have been released for transplantation providing children and adults with a second chance at life.

THE TEAM FIGHT CANCER PROJECT

Fight Cancer Foundation relies on the generous support of the community to achieve our goals and make a real difference to the lives and futures of people living with cancer.

In 2013 The TEAM FIGHT CANCER Project, Fight Cancer Foundation's community fundraising initiative was established to recognise and support the efforts of members of the community who fundraise for us.



FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2013


The Combined surplus for the companies of 2013 was \$161,321 (2012: \$2,845,563). This major change in outcomes is largely due to the reduction of funding received on the completion of the Albury Accommodation Centre and the winding down of the associated public fundraising appeal.

Whilst the companies continued the pursuit of their objectives, a challenging economic climate impacted on the level of non-grant revenues notwithstanding the ongoing direct mail campaigns, which have maintained public awareness of our work.

The Albury Wodonga Accommodation Centre Project (Hilltop) was completed early in the year. The facility opened on 20 March 2013 for cancer patients (and their carers) attending Albury and Wodonga Hospitals for treatment. It has been due to the strong and continuing support of governments, regional Rotary, Lions and Zonta Clubs, other service and sporting clubs, businesses and individuals, that the project has been so successful. Hilltop is experiencing a strong and steady occupancy growth.


